Literacy:

<u>Reading</u>: Continue to read the Ginn Reading Scheme, novels and non-fiction books. LO: To consolidate detailed responses to text.

<u>Grammar</u>: Children will be introduced to compound words and revise the rules regarding direct speech. They will also learn how to use an in front of words beginning with vowels and use a in front of words beginning with a consonant. They will also consolidate their knowledge of alphabetical order

<u>Writing</u>: Learn the structure and language features of procedural and report writing. Revise writing genre already covered, such as, poetry and recounts.

<u>Spellings</u>: Children will learn to spell World War 2 topic words, compound words, common suffixes –ly, -less, -ful, prefixes mis-, non-, homographs (similar sounds)

<u>Tips for parents:</u>

- Record supplementary reading at the back of your child's reading record
- Continue with the weekly spellings tasks.

Numeracy:

Number: place value to 999, subtraction to 999 using exchange (double exchange), revise times tables x2, x3, x4, x5 x10, learn 6 and 9 times tables, use \pounds/p signs, find total/change (shopping), develop knowledge of fractions and understand the concept of division (equal sharing)

Shape and Space: Consolidate the concept of area, become familiar with directional language including 90 degree turns, clockwise, anti-clockwise.

Measures/Handling Data: further develop telling the time- 12 hour clock, digital and analogue (past and to), construct and label pictograms, discuss and interpret results, organise data on to Carroll and Venn diagrams,

Mental Maths/Worded Problems: Consolidate mathematical language. Revise the times tables x2, x3, x4 x5 and x10

Please ensure that numeracy homework is checked and signed by a parent. Practice x2, x3 x4 x5, x6, x9 and x10 tables.

Topic: World War 2

The Arts

Music and drama - develop confidence in singing in a group; show some control of words and tuning; breathe in appropriate places; gain an awareness of the elements of music - longer/shorter notes, higher/lower notes, dynamics including increasing and decreasing levels of sound and silence. Become increasingly aware of their own cultural heritage through music and singing in preparation for St. Patrick's Day concerts. At home practise the songs for the St. Patrick's Day concerts.

Art- create a WW2 poster using Microsoft word text boxes and inserting images; charcoal drawing of Anne Frank; create a multimedia collage.

Focus

Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of new liturgical season - Lent. This is a time to turn back to God and to look forward to Easter.
