

Experimenting is Fun!!!

As part of our topic in World Around Us, Houses and



Homes, we carried out an experiment to discover which material was most suitable to become a Damp Proof Course. A Damp Proof Course is a layer of material

Next we put 30 drops of the coloured water onto the wall. Each of us had a different material between the first and second layer of sugar cubes. Our Visit to the Ulster Museum



On the 13th of September our class went on a trip to the Ulster Museum to learn about the Vikings. A lady showed us a PowerPoint on the Vikings.

This involved taking someone's paper hand and sticking it onto a large piece of card so that by the end, all of our hands were placed side-by-side, together.
